BULLYING BEHAVIOR

Definition: "Bullying is as an act which is: - repeated; aggressive; unwanted; unprovoked; deliberate and is intended to isolate, hurt or humiliate another individual."

Requirements for actions to be "Bullying Behavior"

- There is an imbalance of power between the aggressor and target.
- The behavior has happened over and over again
- The same people are involved
- The negative actions are being done on purpose
- The actions are hurtful (to body or to feelings)
- The target feels powerless to advocate for him/herself

Examples of prohibited bullying behavior:

- Verbal bullying: name calling, threatening, teasing, using racist remarks or rumor spreading.
- Indirect bullying: social exclusion, hurtful gestures or writing hurtful comments
- Physical bullying: hitting, kicking, theft, pushing or any other use of violence or force
- Cyber bullying: harassment using technology such as e-mail, social media, cell phone or websites.

Procedures for Reporting and Responding to Bullying Behavior

- 1. Parents/staff are to report bullying behavior to teacher/s of the student/s involved.
- 2. A Bullying/Behavior Report Form is to be completed by the reporter. (Beginning next week: Forms can be found on the Shepherd of the Hills website. Forms will also available in the office. Parents can request a form be sent home with the student as well.)
- 3. Students are also encouraged to report being a victim of bullying or being a witness to bullying behavior. The adult to whom the behavior is reported is to complete the Reporting Form.
- 4. The Bullying/Behavior Report Form should be turned into the school office no more than 2 days after the incident occurs or is reported to have occurred.

School Procedures for Dealing with Reported Incidents of Bullying

- 1. All incidents of bullying are viewed as serious offenses
- 2. All reported incidents are investigated and document on the Bullying Incident Investigation Form
- 3. The parents of all students involved are notified.
- 4. Further disciplinary measures may be taken.
- 5. The student who is the target may be referred to School Counselors. The student exhibiting bullying behavior may also be referred.

Bullying Prevention

- 1. School rules are taught by teachers and enforced by all staff.
- 2. All students are taught basic skills for managing such situations during the school year. The School Counselor also works with students on conflict resolutions, problem solving and anger management.
- 3. Mediation opportunities are also provided by the School Counselor (when available) for all students to prevent the escalation of conflicts.
